Budget Gimmicks: Governor Malloy Quotes

"Too much borrowing over the years for ongoing expenses is one of the reasons we're in the bad shape we're in."

"...we're finally going to require the state to do what it requires all 169 cities and towns to do: be honest and transparent about the way it keeps its books."

"It follows the simple principles we agreed on two years ago – passing an honest, balanced budget; living within our means; making government smaller and more responsive; and sticking to our plan for growing Connecticut's economy."





What is a Budget Gimmick?

In both the adopted budget and proposed budgets, Governor Malloy and Democrats included "techniques" to hide the true cost of government spending. Here are a few of the most common gimmicks:

- <u>Fund raid</u> Take money from off-budget accounts to help pay for budgeted spending
- <u>Delayed payments</u> Artificially reduce the amount of spending by pushing current year payments out into future years
- <u>One-time revenue</u> Use temporary revenue sources to fund program expenses that will continue into future years ... building holes in future budgets

Spending Money We Don't Have

What's in the Democrats' Budget...

- Creates more than 400 NEW state employee positions
- Adds millions in irresponsible spending
- Creates bigger problems in future budgets by increasing projected deficits
- In total, the Democrats' budget includes \$827.4 million in one-time gimmicks
- Connecticut's budget is structurally unbalanced the state does not have the revenue streams needed to continue to support this recommended level of expenditure
 - More tax increases are on their way!

<u>Original Budget Appropriation</u> - The amount of spending in the FY 15 budget passed last year.	\$17,497.6
<u>Current Service Adds</u> - Required spending additions since the FY 15 budget passed last year (due to caseload increases or other factors).	186.9
<u>Current Services Reductions</u> - Less spending required compared to what was expected when the original FY 15 budget was adopted last year.	(204.9)
<u>Policy Additions</u> - Additional appropriations to fund areas of the budget we believe are in critical need.	45.1
<u>Policy Reductions</u> - Less appropriations due to decisions made that will have little (or no) impact on core state services.	(53.8)

Republican Alternative Budget Adjustments Municipal Aid

"I simply refuse to balance the state's budget on the backs of our local taxpayers."

- Governor Malloy, 2012 2013 Biennial Budget Address
- Governor Malloy and Democrats pass tax increases sales tax, conveyance tax, hotel tax, and luxury tax under the guise of property tax reform. The money \$98 million would go back to cities and towns through the Municipal Revenue Sharing Account (MRSA).
- To save money, the Governor completely eliminated the account but kept the revenue in the General Fund to help cover the deficit.
- Last year, the Democrats bonded \$57 million of the \$98 million for towns. Municipalities lost the remaining \$41 million.

We are proposing to help the Governor keep his promise by restoring the Municipal Revenue Sharing Account

Republican Alternative Budget Adjustments Revenue Policy Changes

Phase-In the Elimination of Taxation on Pension Income

Beginning at a 5% exemption for all income under \$100k for joint filers and \$50k for single filers (\$19.6 million in FY 2015)

Expand the Manufacturing Apprenticeship Program (\$700,000 annually)

Eliminate the Earned Income Tax Credit Program

This program piggybacks off of the federal program by the same name which has been found by the Treasury Inspector General to consistently have the highest level of fraudulent payments made (\$120.7 million in FY 2015)





Republican Alternative Budget Adjustments Use of Excess Revenue

Reducing Long-Term Liabilities

Economic Recovery Notes

Last year, Democrats delayed two years of debt payments to save \$196 million each year of the two-year budget. We are proposing to use FY 2014 excess revenue to make a payment of \$196 million this year and an additional \$150 million payment in FY 2015. These debt payments will result in millions of dollars in unnecessary interest costs being alleviated from the responsibility of state taxpayers.

State Employee Pensions

This proposal includes an additional \$100 million payment into the underfunded State Employee Pension Fund.





Republican Alternative Budget Adjustments Use of Excess Revenue

Modest Tax Relief

Sales Tax Exemption on Clothing and Footwear

Accelerate restoring the exemption from June 2015 to July 2014 (\$133.1 million)

Unemployment Fund Special Assessment

Use excess revenue to pay the interest portion of the state's debt to federal government (\$59 million)

Sales Tax Exemption on Non-Prescription Drugs

Restore the sales tax exemption eliminated by Democrats in 2011 (\$16.5 million)
