Military Department	
East Haven Rifle Range (Army National Guard)	<p><i>Size:</i> 138 acres</p> <p><i>Built:</i> Acquired property in 1905 for use by the armed forces of Connecticut</p> <p><i>Last Upgraded:</i> In 2005, renovation began to construct a modern Army range, which was completed in 2011</p> <p><i>Cost of Recent Upgrades:</i> Undisclosed, but the Connecticut National Guard received federal Military Construction funds for the renovation</p>
Department of Correction	
District 1 – Enfield	<p><i>Size:</i> Approximately 3 acres, including a 10,800 square foot building</p> <p><i>Built:</i> Completed in 2004</p> <p><i>Last Upgraded:</i> Three projects in 2008 and 2010 for structural renovations, environmental remediation, and energy conservation</p> <p><i>Cost of Recent Upgrades:</i> \$993,552 for the three projects total</p>
District 2 – Chesire	<p><i>Size:</i> Approximately 3 acres, including a 11,300 square foot open air range and a 6,000 square foot enclosed pistol range</p> <p><i>Built:</i> 1999 (open air) and 2001 (enclosed)</p> <p><i>Last Upgraded:</i> 2012, ventilation upgrade at enclosed range</p> <p><i>Cost of Recent Upgrade:</i> \$446,778.20</p>

Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection	
State Police Range – Simsbury	<p><i>Size:</i> Approximately 13 acres, including 4 acres for a pistol range and a rifle range</p> <p><i>Built:</i> 1947 by the U.S. Army and purchased in 1962 by the State of Connecticut</p> <p><i>Last Upgraded:</i> In 1968 when a classroom and range tower were constructed</p> <p><i>Cost of Recent Upgrades:</i> None disclosed (No substantial upgrades in the last 10 years, other than mitigating damage caused by flooding from the Farmington River)</p>
Police Officer Standards and Training (POST) Range - Meriden	<p><i>Size:</i> Approximately 1.3 acres</p> <p><i>Built:</i> 1971 or 1972</p> <p><i>Last Upgraded:</i> In 2004 and 2005, the range building was renovated, and in 2013, the berm was mined for projectiles, regarded, and extended</p> <p><i>Cost of Recent Upgrades:</i> Approximately \$150,000 for the two projects total</p>

Department of Energy and Environmental Protection	
Glastonbury Public Shooting Range	<p><i>Size:</i> 40 acres, including a 4 acre range</p> <p><i>Built:</i> 1980</p> <p><i>Last Upgraded:</i> In 2005, constructed a participant viewing pavilion and multi-distance shooting station</p> <p><i>Cost of Recent Upgrade:</i> \$15,189 for materials; DEEP staff and equipment were used</p>
High Rock Cooperative Shooting Range – Naugatuck	<p><i>Size:</i> 1.25 acres</p> <p><i>Built:</i> 1985 and operated in cooperation with the High Rock Shooting Association, Inc.</p> <p><i>Last Upgraded:</i> In 2013 for erosion enhancement project and access road improvements (Hunter’s Mountain Road) and in 2014 for access reconstruction (Spruce Brook Road)</p> <p><i>Cost of Recent Upgrades:</i> \$289,334 for the three projects total, plus \$5,000 from High Rock Association, Inc.; DEEP staff and equipment were used for some work</p>
Wooster Mountain Cooperative Shooting Range - Danbury	<p><i>Size:</i> Approximately 7.4 acres</p> <p><i>Built:</i> 1948 and operated in cooperation with the Danbury Shooting Sports Association, Inc.</p> <p><i>Last Upgraded:</i> Undisclosed, maintenance and improvements are the responsibility of the Danbury Shooting Sports Association, Inc.</p>
Nye Holman Field Archery Range – Tolland	<p><i>Size:</i> 39 acres</p> <p><i>Built:</i> 1960s, formally designated in 1994</p> <p><i>Last Upgraded:</i> In 2006, for a volunteer Boy Scout range reconstruction project</p> <p><i>Cost of Recent Upgrades:</i> \$1,900</p>
