

STATEMENT OF THE CONNECTICUT SENATE REPUBLICAN CAUCUS

"In February, Connecticut Republican legislators stood up and warned of the very electricity bill disaster we have witnessed over the past month. We offered real, practical solutions to mitigate the skyrocketing "Public Benefit" charges, over which our fellow Connecticut residents are now rightfully outraged.
